



# 2025 MAJOR ACCOMPLISHMENTS

In 2025, the Alliance made strategic investments in both the Park’s infrastructure and the programs that bring it to life. From capital improvements to free, community-centered programming and environmental management, these efforts ensure the Park remains dynamic, welcoming and enjoyable for all.

## NATURE CENTER

In August 2025, RIPA broke ground on its Nature Center – a 2,500 square-foot facility scheduled to open in Fall 2026. The Center will serve as a welcoming hub for environmental learning and community engagement, connecting New Yorkers of all ages to the Park’s natural systems. This project is made possible through generous public and private support.

Designed in alignment with Smart Growth and sustainability principles, the Nature Center will feature green infrastructure elements such as a green roof and a rain garden. The space will also include a public restroom.

Located along restored wetlands and a salt marsh, the Nature Center will support hands-on environmental education and serve as the year-round home for RIPA’s nature-based programming and staff, which will expand access, deepen stewardship, and strengthen the Park’s role in environmental resilience.



# TRACK RESURFACING AT ICAHN STADIUM

In October 2025, RIPA celebrated the completion of resurfacing the track at Icahn Stadium, reaffirming its role as a premier destination for athletes of all ages and abilities. The upgraded track meets the highest international standards, capable of hosting world-class competitions, and is accessible to the local community. The track supports athletes at every level – from school practices and community track nights to youth wheelchair races, summer camps and elite competitions, hosting Olympic athletes. By providing a world-class facility alongside inclusive programming, Icahn Stadium inspires New Yorkers to train, compete, and cultivate a lifelong love of sports and fitness.

## SPORTS FIELDS RESTORATION

\$5M Investment

17,500 Permitted Hours Returned to Public

400,000+ Athletes Impacted

In October 2025, after more than two years of closure due to the placement of a HERRC facility on the site, RIPA and NYC Parks proudly reopened Fields 82, 83, 84, and 85. The reopening returned more than 17,500 permit hours to the park, which will serve more than 400,000 athletes each year. These synthetic turf fields, located at the foot of the 103rd Street footbridge, are among Randall’s Island Park’s most popular for soccer, lacrosse, football, field hockey, and other sports.

The \$5M restoration, funded by the City of New York, followed years of advocacy by RIPA, local elected officials, and school and league supporters. The project upgraded the fields with state-of-the-art synthetic turf and new goals, creating a safer, more durable, and more enjoyable space. Adjacent spaces, including picnic areas and lawns, were also restored to enhance the experience for players and spectators. Since reopening, the fields have welcomed student-athletes, youth leagues, and adult sports back to the Park.

# SPORTIME TENNIS FACILITY

In 2025, SPORTIME Randall's Island celebrated the completion of \$55M in privately funded upgrades and was honored with the USTA 2025 Outstanding Tennis Facility Award. The 260,000-square-foot facility, now featuring 33 courts (15 hard, 14 clay, and four red-ball), a clubhouse, and refurbished training and lounge spaces - serves thousands of people each week. SPORTIME also expands access for underserved youth by offering free tennis programming and scholarship pathways.

SPORTIME hosts weekly tournaments and events ranging from USTA league play to international showcases and provides employment for 100 New Yorkers, reinforcing Randall's Island Park as a hub for sports with ongoing economic and community impact.



# SPORTS AT ICAHN STADIUM

With World Athletics Class I track & field certification, seating for 5,000, and a professional-grade soccer pitch, Icahn Stadium remains one of New York City's premier athletic venues.

## TRACK & FIELD

In 2025, Icahn Stadium hosted 69 track and field events and road races, welcoming nearly 200,000 athletes and an estimated 400,000 spectators. Twelve organizations called Icahn Stadium their home track and the Stadium served as the championship venue for PSAL, Catholic Schools, the Associate of Independent Schools and NYE DOE Middle School meets – placing it at the center of competitive track in NYC.

A highlight of the season was the 20th Anniversary U.S. Track & Field Youth Outdoor National Championships, which brought thousands of young athletes from across the country to compete. Icahn Stadium also hosted its second Athlos event, drawing a sold-out crowd and nearly four million viewers worldwide. With two U.S. records broken during competition, it cemented Icahn Stadium's reputation as *the* home for professional women's track and field.



## SOCCER

Icahn Stadium continued to elevate its standing as a premier soccer venue in 2025. The pitch hosted home matches for Gotham FC and NYCFC II, both of which are scheduled to return in 2026. The Stadium also welcomed teams to train on the pitch, including international clubs Everton FC, C.F. Monterrey Women, and national teams from the Korean Republic and Australia. Use of the pitch at Icahn Stadium increased nearly four-fold between 2024 and 2025, reflecting the growing demand and the Stadium's rising profile in the global soccer community.





# PARK STEWARDSHIP

# ATHLETIC FIELDS

Randall’s Island Park is where New York City goes to play. Home to nearly half of Manhattan’s athletic fields, the Park welcomed more than 1M field users in 2025. From youth programs to local club teams, school leagues and adult recreational leagues, it provides New Yorkers of all ages a place to train, compete, and stay active.

In 2025, RIPA’s Sports Field team resurfaced Field 71 before the start of the lacrosse season. Staying current with industry advancements, the Sports Field team regularly introduces new seed varieties and invests in purchasing specialized equipment, while also strategically expanding the field rotation program. While a field may occasionally be offline during rotation, this intentional approach improves turf health, enhances safety, and ensures long-term durability – ultimately providing better access and playability for every athlete.

# URBAN FARM

Throughout 2025, RIPA's Urban Farm flourished as both a productive growing space and an outdoor classroom where food access, environmental sustainability, and learning intersect. The one-acre farm features more than 125 raised beds, two greenhouses, rice paddies, a fruit tree orchard, and a composting system. It produces hundreds of culturally relevant crops that reflect the communities RIPA serves.

The Farm also serves as a vibrant destination for public engagement. Open on weekends from April through October, the Farm welcomed thousands of visitors who explored interpretative signage, participated in workshops, browsed the seed library, observed pollinators, and gathered in family-friendly spaces designed to spark curiosity and connection to the natural world. The Farm also expanded its Community Seed Distribution Program – a key initiative that supports food access across the South Bronx, East Harlem, and beyond, and distributed nearly 4,000 seedlings to partners.

The Urban Farm's food production, public access, and educational use demonstrate the power of a place-based model to grow food, support community connection, and foster environmental stewardship.

# GARDENS, MEADOWS & LANDSCAPE MAINTENANCE

In 2025, the Park's meadows, gardens, and greenstreets welcomed more visitors, wildlife, and plant diversity thanks to the dedication of RIPA's Horticulture team. The team manages year-round care of five gardens, three meadows, more than eight greenstreets, and multiple recreational spaces, ensuring the Park remains lush and sustainable. Key restoration efforts included improving the Water's Edge Garden, along the Harlem River, removing invasive species, repairing erosion-damaged paths, stabilizing soil, and enhancing conditions for native forest growth. Seasonal plantings provided vibrant displays, while the in-house plant nursery propagated hundreds of plants to support landscapes and community events.

Through this work, RIPA cultivates both thriving landscapes and thriving connections between New Yorkers and the Park.

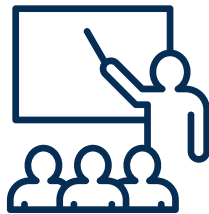


# WATERFRONT & NATURAL AREAS

In 2025, RIPA's Natural Areas team continued to offer New Yorkers opportunities to enjoy, explore, and care for the Park's wetlands, forests, grasslands, meadows, and shoreline. More than 20 acres were stewarded through native plantings, invasive species management, and ecological monitoring to support biodiversity, resilience, and long-term environmental health.

Public access and engagement expanded through improved trails and pathways, community programs, and volunteer opportunities that encouraged hands-on learning and connection to the Park's natural habitats. Thousands of volunteer hours, along with 1,300 hours from our Youth Stewardship programs, supported the planting of native grasses, wildflowers, shrubs, and trees.

A major 2025 milestone was the restoration and reopening of the Living Shoreline – a key public space that was closed for several years due to construction. The project revitalized meadows, restored pathways, and strengthened forest canopy, reconnecting visitors to the waterfront and enhancing habitat value.

# OVERVIEW

In 2025, more than 20,000 participants visited the Park to enjoy the Alliance's free public programs. From summer camp and environmental education to waterfront restoration projects, health and wellness programs, festivals, and guided tours, visitors experienced the Park in meaningful ways. Participants explored wetlands, the Urban Farm, gardens, and diverse natural habitats while learning about birds, fish, pollinators and local ecosystems.

Whether through birdwatching, botanical arts or hands-on, STEM-based, environmental learning, RIPA offered programming that connected people to nature, recreation, and community. More than 300 free programs were offered throughout the year, creating meaningful opportunities for people of all ages and abilities.

# EDUCATION

## COMMUNITY FOOD EDUCATION

Rooted at RIPA's Urban Farm, the Community Food Education Program utilizes the site as a living classroom to deliver edible education classes, food demonstrations, and SNAP-ED-aligned curricula. In 2025, the program reached families, pantry clients, and students through food demonstrations, cooking workshops, and field trips. Rooted in equity and community partnership, the program strengthens food literacy, builds confidence in the kitchen, and supports healthier eating habits, especially in neighborhoods most impacted by food insecurity. RIPA delivered more programs, incorporated cooking into classes, and deepened relationships with community members.

## ENVIRONMENTAL EDUCATION

RIPA's Environmental Education Programs invite the public to experience the Park's wetlands, shoreline, gardens, and Urban Farm through tours and interactive exploring. Whether fishing, birding, kayaking, drawing or simply observing, participants gain a rich and meaningful understanding of the Park's ecosystem. In 2025, signature programs like Wormy Wednesday, Pollinator Palooza, and bird tours returned while new offerings such as Femme Fishing and Wetland Wednesdays expanded access to the Park's natural resources and supported community-based environmental monitoring. Water-based programming reached new audiences through public events including City of Water Day and World Oceans Day.



# EDUCATION

## PARK-AS-LAB



Park-as-Lab is a community-centered research initiative that transforms Randall’s Island into a living laboratory. The program supports STEM education and deepens understanding of urban ecosystems by engaging students in monitoring projects, including water quality testing, fish and bird surveys, and habitat assessments. Participants contribute to research that informs stewardship of the Island’s natural areas while building environmental literacy. In 2025, the program expanded water sampling locations in Queens and Manhattan, and for the second year, partnered with the Billion Oyster Project, which contributed to regional research and restoration efforts. These efforts are made possible through partnerships with organizations that include Bee Conservancy, Baruch College, Columbia University, New York University, and Cornell Cooperative Extension.

## WATERFRONT STEWARDSHIP

The Waterfront Stewardship Program invites students to explore the Park’s natural areas through dynamic, STEM-based field trips, aligned with New York State’s learning standards. Students practice ecological observation and data collection in wetlands and local waterbodies. In 2025, participation increased, with the team offering seven more classes than the year prior. Students recorded over 600 animals during hands-on seining lessons.



# SUMMER CAMP

In the summer of 2025, RIPA welcomed 5,817 New York City children to its free Summer Camp program, made possible with support from the Helping Hand Foundation. The program provided a safe, joyful, and enriching experience for youth from East Harlem, the South Bronx, and other historically underserved communities. Campers explored Randall's Island Park and built friendships, confidence, and curiosity through outdoor learning and play.



Activities blended recreation, creativity, and environmental education, from soccer, basketball, and dance to visual arts and hands-on ecology lessons in the Park's wetlands, gardens, and shoreline. The program concluded with a Field Day and Closing Celebration, including the presentation of the Howie Robinson Good Sportsmanship Award. Returning campers stepped into junior counselor roles, developing leadership skills and helping shape a positive, inclusive community for the next generation.

# 2025 EVENTS & ACTIVITIES

## FESTIVALS & CELEBRATIONS

The Park came alive through 12 celebrations and three major festivals including the Earth Day Festival, Waterfront Festival, and Harvest Festival. Mid-size events such as Big Truck Day, Park After Dark, Taste of the Farm, and Pollinator Palooza activated the Park as well. In partnership with 45 community organizations – many based in East Harlem, the South Bronx, and Astoria – these events strengthened local connections and offered attendees opportunities to enjoy educational activities, games, face painting, arts and crafts, live music, and food.



## ARTS & CULTURE

More than 2,000 participants engaged in arts and culture workshops, performances, and events including Live and Local: Art Pop-Up, featuring 47 local artists. Programs highlighted creativity across the Park's gardens, lawns, and Urban Farm, with initiatives for seniors, families, and youth. Family-friendly programming, including Storytime Stretches, a puppet show, and drop-in art activities introduced children to the arts in a playful, welcoming environment. RIPA also engaged participants during the winter months through botanical and horticultural art workshops.



## HEALTH & WELLNESS

RIPA's Health and Wellness programming continued to position the Park as an accessible space for movement and mindfulness. Through more than 60 health and wellness programs and 22 food demonstrations, we engaged more than 2,400 participants. Yoga, community bike rides, and plant-based cooking demonstrations encouraged physical activity, connection, and awareness of healthy, local food. Programs also featured inclusive opportunities such as tandem cycling for vision-impaired riders, tours, and bike rides supported by Citi Bike and El Barrio Bikes - reinforcing the Park as a hub for inclusive, outdoor recreation.



# COMMUNITY STORIES



## JAZY CINTRON, LOFT HEIGHTS MOVEMENT

Jazy brought joy, movement, and mindfulness to Randall’s Island Park in 2025! From weekly yoga sessions to engaging story time activities at our festivals, she made wellness and literacy fun and inclusive for visitors of all ages. A Bronx-based mover and shaker, Jazy’s energy and expertise helped bring our programs to life across the Park!



## WOODLAWN CEMETERY’S BRIDGES TO CRAFT TO CAREERS

RIPA hosted 15 interns from Woodlawn Cemetery’s Bridges to Craft to Careers program. Interns gained hands-on experience at the Living Shoreline by pruning trees, removing invasive species, and rebuilding trails – while learning about habitat management. Beyond the fieldwork, interns connected with RIPA staff to explore careers in environmental stewardship. Programs like this help build the next generation of green leaders while keeping Randall’s Island Park thriving!



## LITTLE SISTERS OF THE ASSUMPTION (LSA)

RIPA brought fresh flavors and hands-on learning to LSA’s food pantry in East Harlem in 2025, as it has for the past five years! With RIPA donating nearly 2,500 lbs. of fresh produce this year, families explored seasonal produce by tasting, cooking, and discovering new favorites like bok choy and daikon radishes. This partnership helps communities facing food insecurity build skills, try healthy foods, and connect to fresh, local produce.

## A NIGHT TO REMEMBER: 2025 GALA



Hosted on a summer evening at the Urban Farm, the 2025 RIPA Gala celebrated the 20th anniversary of Icahn Stadium and its legacy of athletic excellence and community impact. More than 550 guests gathered to enjoy live music and immersive experiences, which highlighted the Park's programs and history.

The evening honored Pinky Keehner, Alex Egan, and Coach Pat Dormer, and welcomed athletes and supporters from across the City.

The Gala successfully raised \$1.1M for Park maintenance and year-round programming – an inspiring show of commitment to the future of Randall's Island Park.

# CORPORATE VOLUNTEER PROGRAM

RIPA's Corporate Volunteer Program connects companies with meaningful service opportunities that support the care and improvement of Randall's Island Park. In 2025, corporate teams contributed their time, energy, and funding that amplified the work of RIPA's staff, helping to ensure the Park remains a safe and welcoming urban greenspace for millions of visitors.

In 2025, corporate groups played a central role in restoring the Living Shoreline. Teams from Pernod Ricard, Deloitte, BDO, Morgan Stanley, Paul Weiss, and others contributed over 500 hours, removing invasive species, clearing over 200 saplings, and installing paths and mulch to improve public access.

# PHILANTHROPIC SUPPORT & GRANTS

Philanthropic and grant support are essential to the health, character, and long-term impact of Randall’s Island Park. Public and private investments strengthen natural landscapes, expand education and workforce development opportunities, and advance critical capital projects that enhance the visitor experience.

From restoring the Island’s urban forest and strengthening climate resilience, to maintaining and improving our athletic fields, supporting paid youth apprenticeships in environmental science and advancing plans for a new Nature Center, external support helps ensure the Park continues to reflect RIPA’s core values now and into the future. These three grants below are some of many that help us maintain and improve Randall’s Island Park.

## NYS DEC: FORESTRY GRANT

A multi-year grant from the State of New York that supports large-scale tree restoration, strengthening the Park’s urban forest, improving habitat health, and enhancing climate resilience for surrounding communities.

## PINKERTON FOUNDATION

Funding from the Pinkerton Foundation supported RIPA's paid internship program, by which RIPA hosted 16 high school and college-aged interns who had the opportunity to explore green careers, build professional networks, and get hands-on job experience under the mentorship of seasoned professionals.

## STEVEN & ALEXANDRA COHEN FOUNDATION

Capital support from the Steven & Alexandra Cohen Foundation advances planning for RIPA’s upcoming Nature Center, expanding opportunities for outdoor education and deeper connections between New Yorkers and the Park’s natural environment.

# STATEMENT FROM THE TREASURER

## Fiscal Year 2025 Summary and Operating Results

Fiscal Year 2025 was a year of strong financial performance and strategic investment for the Randall's Island Park Alliance (the "Alliance" or "RIPA"). The Alliance closed the year more favorable than its approved budget, reflecting disciplined financial management and a diversified, resilient revenue base. Increased revenue from grants, donors, and events, combined with careful cost control, enabled the Alliance to meet operational needs while advancing critical capital improvements.

Operating expenses were approximately 13% below budget, driven by savings across professional services, maintenance and repairs, programming, and communications. These efficiencies were achieved without compromising operations, the quality of our public programming or staff capacity, and underscoring RIPA's commitment to responsible stewardship of resources.

The Alliance ended Fiscal Year 2025 with a modest operating gain, which will be allocated toward capital improvements that RIPA stewards to enhance the Park's infrastructure and long-term public value. These results reflect a thoughtful balance of fiscal responsibility and investment, ensuring the Park remains a safe and dynamic destination for millions of New Yorkers.

## Net Assets and Financial Position

As of December 31, 2025, RIPA reported total assets of approximately **\$12.7M**.

Net assets declined from the prior year due to planned capital spending, including investments in Icahn Stadium and the Nature Center.

Despite this decrease, RIPA remains in a strong financial position, with sufficient liquidity and reserves to support ongoing operations and future priorities. The Alliance enters the next fiscal year well positioned to sustain its mission and continue enhancing Randall's Island Park for generations to come.

## Audit Results

The Alliance undergoes an independent, external audit every year and has consistently received a clean audit. 
